


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
@WildcatTribune Hillman to Lead Wildcats



Are you ready for some crazy writing? NaNoWriMo stands for National Novel Writing Month; almost 300,000 authors are participating this year. These writers include some of DV's very own students, who are writing an entire novel in 30 days!

Solely in the month of November, authors across the entire country are embarking on a month-long endeavor to write 50,000 words, or the equivalent of a 175-page-long novel. That means writing at a rate of 1,667 words per day!

Ms. Pike, DVHS librarian, encourages students to partake in the excitement; she knows firsthand how exhilarating NaNo can be, this being her third venture. She writes alongside student NaNo-ers during after school write-ins in the library, where the writers share brain fuel, including both snacks and ideas. Ms. Pike enjoys seeing writers at Dougherty participate in this event because, "when students write a novel in a month, it's awesome." She particularly relishes write-ins because she believes that "there needs to be a little writing corner in the world for writing nerds

The intensity of all that writing encourages NaNo-ers to remove themselves from the pressures of school and other stressors, instead focusing on word count and using writing as a creative outlet to experiment. The slogan "Quantity over Quality" characterizes NaNoWriMo, permitting writers to just start writing without a plan. Junior Elise Pohlhammer, a 2012 NaNoWriMo winner, agrees.

"NaNo is just a time for me to sit down and see what my brain can come up with." She also finds NaNo "something you can be a part of, and be proud that you're a part of."

Writing at least 1,667 words per day



is no facile task, but the reward far outweighs the hardships. Junior Jessica Chipley, also a 2012 NaNoWriMo winner, explains, "NaNo has its ups and downs and you really have to roll with the punches of your imagination. Your muse has its own mind and can throw curveballs at you. When you can find a way to coexist with your muse, you'll be able to write something truly special."

NaNoWriMo is the incredible experience for writers to emerge triumphantly at the end of 50,000 words, wielding their own novel as a beautiful, shining trophy.

DVHS Students Ponder Their Digital Footprint

These days, before a newborn takes his first trip home from the hospital, two types of footprints will be made for him. The first is done in the hospital nursery, where a nurse rubs dark ink on the tyke's foot and stamps it on a piece of paper. The second is made when one of the family members takes the baby's first pictures and posts them on the internet, creating what is then on called the baby's "digital footprint".

Digital footprint is defined by Educatorstechnology.com as "the collection of all the traces you leave in electronic environments as you use or move through them. Some is content you actively volunteer—like your Facebook profile. Other material is passive—the cookies a site stores in your browser...All this data

can be aggregated to build a profile of you and your behavior." So every time we venture onto the internet - whether to tweet, email, shop or check our Facebook - we scatter personal data about ourselves out into cyberspace and expand our digital footprint.

Our digital footprint also grows every time someone else posts something

about us; for example, if they tag us in a photo. Whether we like it or not, once created, our digital footprint is permanent. This is because once we share any kind of "our data" online, it becomes someone else's property that can be copied, broadcasted and shared with others.

Social media experts warn,

"What goes on the internet, stays on the internet." Most companies know this and use this information to pre-screen job applicants. According to a 2012 survey conducted by Harris Interactive, 37 percent of the companies surveyed use social media to pre-screen

> before making a hiring decision. Most social media experts advise: "if there is any doubt, don't post it." As for minimizing the role others play in tarnishing your online image, experts also suggest you enable the Facebook photo tagging permission so that your friends" can't tag you without your approval.

So The Wildcat Tribune wondered if DVHS students ever thought about what kind of digital footprint they are creating for themselves. Since the Facebook page is a major component of many students' online image, we walked around campus, randomly asking students the following "Knowing two questions: many employers these days are looking over applicants' Facebook pages to get a better idea of what kind of person they might be hiring, would you say that your current Facebook page – the way you have it right now -- would help or hurt your chances of getting hired? Would you consider cleaning it up or scrubbing it a bit before applying?"

Junior Neal Sanghvi responded, "My Facebook page would help me. I don't have anything bad on there; the worst is some weird pictures. In addition, they would see I


