



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

Russia Experiences Metamorphosis in Government

Once a proud Communist country who attempted to rule the world with an iron fist, the former Soviet state has digressed from its prior

convictions. An examination of Russia's aiding Edward Snowden and recent tolerance of Syrian oppression outlines a metamorphosis in the Russian government's perceptions on political liberties and sovereignty.

Lon Snowden, Edward's father and the interviewee for the Reuters article, indicates that his son will probably not return to the U.S. because his opportunities are less limited in Russia at this point. Clearly, Russia's acceptance of Snowden, which Reuters furthers as a potential boiling point in U.S.-Russian relations, will outline a bit of a conversion of the idea of freedom of speech in the country.

However, Russian-American relations aren't the only things that illustrate a transformation. Russia's acceptance of Syria has brought a digression from a traditional Russian stance that has brought President Vladimir

Putin a Nobel Peace Prize. Syria's oppressive regime has been coerced by Putin to turn over chemical stockpiles to international collectors, which, according to a *Washington Times* article, is ironic, considering Russians themselves provided numerous weapons to Assad's regime.

To recap, Russia has modernized itself and become more accepting of the liberties it once stood against. The only thing that has stayed constant is Russia's desire to stand against the U.S. in the political arena. Seeing how Russia has supported Snowden, and "conveniently" compromised with Assad, this seems to be only the beginning of the reformation of the state.
